






European Territorial Cooperation / Interreg






Geographic distribution of ETC funds and partners of programmes within the scope of this study





16% Public authorities (local, regional, national) Irish Partners Breakdown



Example

Objectives

Within this Specific Objective, the Programme aims .

- Develop green/blue infrastructure to ensure ecosystems and prevent the loss of biodiversity
- Embed in strategic ecosystem-based approach corridors, biodiversity, and natural capital.
- Show the benefits of sound green/blue infra: effects e.g., heat stress.
- Reduce the incidence of human activities on air

Target groups

- Local/regional/national authorities, govern organisations, (including agencies or para-pub relating to rivers, environment, natural protecti Results biodiversity protection and green/blue infrast The **combination of these activities** may lead to results such as: more resilient regions.
- Universities, public research centres, private education, training centres are highly relevan.

Activities

Projects should implement a combination of activities, such as:

- Elaboration and implementation of joint strategies and/or action plans, for example, nature management plans for measuring, maintaining, enhancing, and valorising green/blue infrastructure, ecosystem services, biodiversity (e.g., invasive species); or adaptation and mitigation measures at local or regional level with the aim to reduce heat stress and air pollution in the NWE area.
- Pilot actions for testing tools and/or solutions, for example demonstration and joint implementation of scalable and replicable solutions to embed green infrastructure and ecosystem-based approach in relevant strategies and measures; or of innovative measures to reduce heat stress by enhancing and installing green and blue infrastructure for adaptation.
- Capacity building and awareness raising activities in the field of innovation for resilience, for example, training schemes related to biodiversity, promoting its management, or planning and implementation of environmental protection and nature-based solutions, green / blue infrastructure, etc.

- Key aspects of biodiversity preservation, green/blue infrastructure or heat stress and air pollution better embedded into territorial strategies and local initiatives.
- Increased knowledge and capacity of stakeholders about green/blue infrastructure and biodiversity-enhancing / nature-friendly practices.
- · Innovative technologies, solutions, products, and services taken up aiming to prevent or reduce heat stress and air pollution, ensuring coherence between the proposed approaches and local/regional needs.










Who are we looking for? (beneficiaries/project partners)

- Public: Local/regional/national authorities, governmental agencies, public equivalent organisations
- Private: SMEs and business support organisations
- Academia: Universities, public research centres, private research units, schools and higher education, training centres
- **Civil Society:** Sectoral associations, NGOs, lobby organisations, citizens groups







Type of projects:

Projects are expected to:

- Jointly tackle common territorial challenges and/or opportunities.
- **Develop / test / adapt new or existing approaches and implement** them in different contexts (e.g., regions, sectors, environments, etc.)
- Aim at the further **dissemination**, **uptake and roll-out** of the approach developed.







Type of activities:

A **combination** of at least 2 of the following activities:

- Elaboration and implementation of joint strategies and/or action plans
- Joint development and implementation of pilot actions testing tools and/or solutions
- Capacity building and awareness raising activities (incl. joint trainings)







Clearly defined needs and relevance

- Specifies why it is needed.
- What territorial challenges and opportunities it will address?
- What change (project results) in NWE territories?
- Identifies the profile of the territories it will intervene in (i.e., rural, peri-urban, urban...).
- Embedded in an **overall** strategic framework.








A balanced partnership and transnational approach

- Involves the right types of organisations
- Consider the quadruple helix
- IP text defines **target groups** per SO.
- Transnational nature










Clear contribution to Interreg NWE objectives

- Needs to contribute to one of the **Programme SOs**.
- Clear **objective** that links to one SO – realistic and achievable.
- Up to three project specific objectives ('foreseen project specific objectives' in Step 1).
- Clearly defines and quantifies expected outputs and results.







Builds on and goes beyond existing approaches

- A good project does not reinvent the wheel.
 - Develop and test new approaches;
 - Adapt and implement existing approaches in different sectors/regions for further uptake (as defined in the NWE IP).

Long-term effects

- Activities must be included in the Work Packages.
- Clearly linked to activities and Work Package objectives.





A strong intervention logic

STEP 1



- What **territorial challenges** will the project address (across NWE)?
- Is the project **a good fit** with the priorities and specific objectives?
- How will our project address the challenges?
- Who are the key actors we will involve?
- What are the expected results?

STEP 2

- What are the phases of the project to ensure implementation?
- Is the budget well designed? Project duration?











Context- The European Bioeconomy Strategy 2018





- to develop a circular, sustainable bioeconomy for Europe, strengthening the connection between economy, society, and environment.
- Driver UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) & the climate objectives of the Paris Agreement.



Stage 1

- Attended an Interreg NWE info session program was suitable for our needs
- Project concept Prepared a 3- page document with illustration
- Met with Interreg NWE NCP to review suggested that we take a leader follower approach
- NCP helped in identifying potential partners
- Virtual meetings with partners and selecting most appropriate budgets were not discussed at stage 1
- Submitted stage 1
- Outcome successful







Stage 2

- Attended meeting in Lille for successful stage 1 applicants and met with project officer – provided useful feedback on how to improve proposal for stage 2 preparation – particularly with respect
 - to a balanced consortium
 - Leader follower approach
 - budget breakdown
- Had meetings with partners at this stage asked them to develop their individual tasks and work packages.
- Some partners dropped out including one who dropped out 1 week before submission
- NCP very helpful in finding alternatives







Stage 2 submission

- During preparation of Stage 2 we had regular meetings with PO in Lille.
- She read updates on EMS and provided very useful feedback
- Matched funding required and confirmed for all partners Gas
 Networks Ireland through the GNI Innovation Fund provided cash
 input for UL matching funds.
- HINT start early and communicate regularly with the PO and NCP







CONTRACT

- Interreg NWE supplied standard contract terms regarding responsibility and liability had to be agreed by all partners.
- Definition of minimum and state aid declarations needed to be confirmed
- Our contract was delayed by 6 months –
- Kick off meting March 9 & 10 2020 and then Covid
